Upgrade your boiler with the Switch Together Scheme

Heat pumps provide an efficient and cost-effective method for heating your home that reduces reliance on fossil fuels using modern technology, while providing year round comfort in your home. Switch Together is a group-buying scheme designed to make the upgrade from traditional boilers to energy-efficient heat pumps easier and more affordable by pooling together interested homeowners allowing installers to offer competitive bids. The scheme is open to any residents across Surrey that own their property and are interested in upgrading to efficient, eco-friendly heating with professional installation at a competitive price.

To take part in the scheme, simply register through Switch Together by 31 October 2025. You can then expect to receive a free, no obligation personal offer tailored to your home estimating the cost for your heat pump installation, factoring in group savings and government grants.

Funded energy upgrades for low-income households

The Warm Homes Local Grant is a government-funded scheme that helps low-income households in England improve energy efficiency and switch to low-carbon heating. The scheme is managed by Surrey County Council on behalf of 11 boroughs and districts across Surrey, with funding provided by the Department of Energy Security and Net Zero (DESNZ).

This is a fully government funded grant, where eligible homeowners are not expected to make any contributions to the cost. The grant allows residents to receive a range of retrofitting measures, from energy performance upgrades such as various forms of insulation or window and door upgrades to low carbon heating, making your home more comfortable and lowering energy bills. Landlords can also receive full funding for one property where tenants meet low-

income criteria, but for any additional properties, must contribute a minimum of 50% of the upgrade costs, with no limit on the number of properties that can be upgraded.

Peregrine falcon rescued from Surrey Towers

A young peregrine falcon that became trapped on the roof of Surrey Towers in Addlestone is now thriving, thanks to the swift actions of Runnymede's control room team and an expert bird specialist. The chick, unable to return to his nest, was first spotted on CCTV by one of the Council's experienced control centre operators, alerting her colleague who quickly contacted a trusted bird specialist she knew personally.

Working alongside the housing team, the control room arranged safe access to the roof, allowing the specialist to recover the stranded falcon. He was then cared for off-site before being successfully returned to the area several weeks later. Since his return, the young falcon has been seen regularly on CCTV near its original nest, often alongside his parents — a promising sign he has been successfully reintroduced to his natural environment.

Funding awarded to tackle chewing gum on streets

A £25,000 grant from the Chewing Gum Task Force, administered by environmental charity Keep Britain Tidy, will help the Council to clean up gum and reduce gum littering. Runnymede is one of 52 across the country that have successfully applied to the Chewing Gum Task Force, now in its fourth year, for funds to clean gum off pavements and prevent it from being littered again. Estimates suggest the annual clean-up cost of chewing gum for councils in the UK is around £7 million and, according to Keep Britain Tidy, around 77% of England's streets and 99% of retail sites are stained with gum.

This work will see targeted cleaning in key areas such as Guildford Street in Chertsey, Station Road in Addlestone and Egham High Street - places where gum staining has long affected the look and feel of our town centres. We are also bringing in additional cleaning teams to boost capacity and accelerate the rollout across key public spaces. As part of the campaign, new gum removal equipment is being introduced, and grounds maintenance staff are receiving specialist training to ensure the work is carried out effectively and safely. A low-impact, eco-friendly steam method will be used to remove gum without damaging paving surfaces, including sensitive historic stonework. Monitoring and evaluation carried out by Behaviour Change – a not-for-profit social enterprise - has shown that in areas that benefitted from the first and second year of funding, a reduced rate of gum littering of up to 80% was seen in the first two months.
